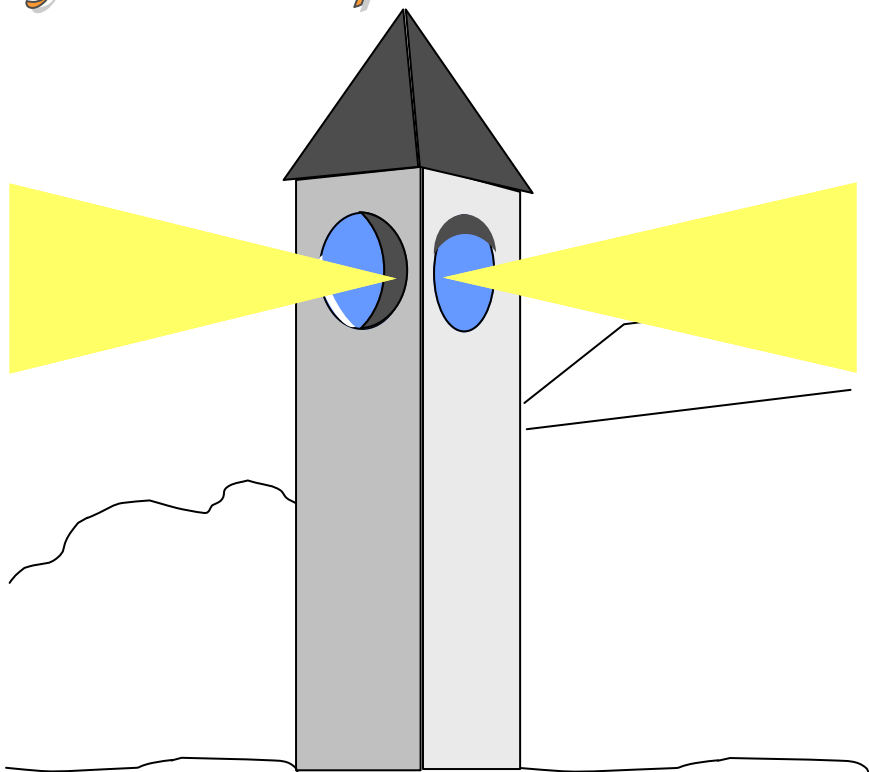

The Care and Counseling Center of Georgia is a nonprofit, ecumenical organization offering counseling, pastoral care and education to individuals, couples, families and organizations. The programs of the center have a combined history of over 90 years in the field of Pastoral Counseling and Care. This rich history secures our mission: "to provide healing, wholeness, and hope and to educate others for this service ."

The local counseling center of CCC located at St. Luke's is the **Perimeter Counseling Center**. It is directed by Pastoral Counselor Georgia Griffin. She schedules on-premises appointments in her private office with separate entry to the church building.

DRUID HILLS NIGHT SHELTER

Located in Druid Hills Presbyterian Church's McIver Hall, next to the main church building, The Night Shelter at Druid Hills is the result of a partnership of more than 20 churches and organizations throughout the metro area.

The Night Shelter at Druid Hills provides transitional housing for up to thirty men who are employed or actively seeking work. Referred by Crossroads, Samaritan House or Intown Community Assistance our guests receive dinner, a safe night's sleep, a shower and breakfast. In 2010, the Night Shelter became a year round facility and the St. Luke's Outreach Committee unanimously agreed to meet this challenge by providing meals year round, basically doubling our commitment. St. Luke's members prepare, serve and share dinner with 30 men on the 4th Sunday of every month.

Who: St. Luke's members , Sunday School classes and Small Groups

When: Fourth Sunday of each month for 2011, volunteers are needed in April, May, June and July 2011

What: Prepare, deliver and share dinner with 30 men at the shelter.

Where: Make meals in your own home, bring to St. Luke's; travel to the shelter to host the meal.

Why: Service to others struggling with homelessness

Cost: Cost of a prepared or purchased meal, no cost if just going to visit and share with the residents

In 1987, the churches and synagogues of the Dunwoody/Sandy Springs communities agreed to work together to establish an independent organization to serve as the front line resource and referral center for people seeking assistance in the Dunwoody/Sandy Springs area. The resulting organization is the Community Action Center (CAC), staffed by both professional and volunteer help.

CAC is the only agency in Sandy Springs and Dunwoody to focus on the prevention of homelessness and provision of basic needs to individuals and families. CAC offers financial assistance, food, clothing, and holiday special assistance. Through the Youth Enrichment Program, they arrange for area youth who are in need to receive back-to-school supplies and attend summer camps and after-school programs. They also provide referral services to other agencies that can meet specific needs.

When: Ongoing

What: Visit CAC and assist staff. Provide funds for transportation and housing assistance. Donate furnishings and clothing.

Where: Bring canned goods to St. Luke's. Volunteer at the CAC in Sandy Springs.

Why: Service to others struggling with economic and family issues, including homelessness

For over ten years, St. Luke’s has teamed with Habitat for Humanity to strengthen Atlanta neighborhoods by building homes for families. For many years, St. Luke’s has partnered with Dodd-Sterling United Methodist Church, located in Southeast Atlanta, to make the vision of Habitat founder Millard Fuller—that of “simple, decent” houses for low income families—a reality. These families are headed by parents who are now able to have a true home in which to help their children learn, play, grow, and love.

INTERFAITH OUTREACH HOME

IOH is a transitional home for married couples and single heads of households with children, which opened its doors in 1992. It is working to end the cycle of homelessness among families in the Atlanta metropolitan area. Statistics show that the homeless population largely consists of families with children under the age of 17 years.



Many of the families have no resources upon entering the IOH program, and IOH relies on contributions for churches and organizations to supply needed items and service to the families. The facilities on Buford Highway in Doraville consist of ten small apartments, each with kitchen and bath. They also include laundry facilities, a food pantry, an after school room, a classroom, staff offices, plus a small playground.

St. Luke's supports IOH in various ways. An important part of the IOH program is the life skills training for the parents. St. Luke's prepares and delivers dinner for families involved in training.

In 2009, St. Luke's participated in Operation Christmas Child for the first time, successfully delivering 115 filled and decorated shoeboxes for children around the world.

In early November, grab a shoebox (used from your closet or new from the store) and fill it with gifts for a child—animals, toys, dolls, art supplies, etc. Bring the shoebox and \$7 to SLPC before the deadline and St. Luke's and Operation Christmas Child will get your box whisked away to a needy child in one of 43 countries around the world, just in time for Christmas. Your gift child will also have the opportunity to hear about Jesus and his love for them with a series of publications as follow-up to your shoebox gift.

SIX STAR REFUGEE PARTNERSHIP



Our mission is to provide housing and supportive services to refugee families during their transition to self-reliance and to advocate on behalf of the refugee community.

Six Star Refugee Partnership, Inc. is a 501(c)3 that began in 1999 when six area churches joined to help serve the refugee community in Atlanta. Refugees are the uprooted victims of violence, war and political, religious, ethnic and racial oppression. Six Star partners with International Rescue Committee (IRC) whose families are identified by the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR). Most relief organizations that work with refugee resettlement are only able to offer support for about 120 days; Six Star maintains active involvement with families for at least 12 months. Most families arrive with all their worldly possessions in one or two duffle bags each. Six Star provides a fully furnished home for every family; with donations of everything you could imagine to set up housekeeping.

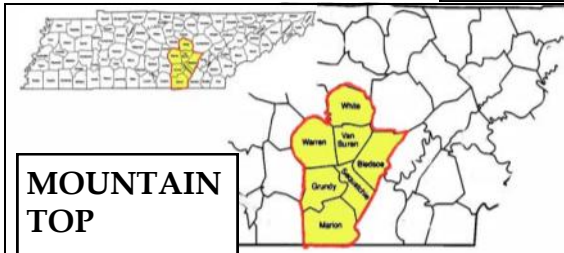

WORLD OUTREACH

On the five pages that follow, you will learn more about five of our outreach partners whose primary focus moves us beyond the greater Atlanta area in terms of participation. We have provided the maps below to help you get a sense of where we serve with these partners.





AIR exists to assist local communities in Central America conserve their environment through reforestation, farming and education. AIR works to develop self-sustaining environmental programs that can be managed and implemented by community groups, not outsiders.

The destruction of forests in Guatemala has far-reaching impact. When trees are cut down and not replaced a cycle of destruction begins that ends in the utter desolation of the land and the people. AIR works not only to replant trees to protect the soil and replenish nutrients, but also to involve the community in managing their own affairs. St. Luke's support has enabled AIR to become a fully functioning agency that is becoming one of the leading environmental organizations in Central America.

CONSTRUCTORES PARA CRISTO

Since 1992, missionaries from St. Luke's have participated in a week-long, life-changing experience by traveling together to Piedras Negras, Mexico. The work awaiting the team is to build a three-room, 400-square foot home side-by-side with a Mexican family. There is literally a job for everyone. Those with physical strength can move cinder blocks and lift roof panels, but everyone can pitch in by applying the special stucco substance to the outside and inside walls. Health, food, and worship coordinators are critical to insure that the team members are happy, safe, and spiritually fed. Beyond the tangible output of a house at the end of the week, the mission experience bridges cultural gaps, shows God's presence in all parts of His creation, strengthens relationships within the mission team, and contributes to breaking the cycle of poverty in this Mexican town. St. Luke's has built over 30 homes in partnership with Constructores Para Cristo (Builders for



Christ) which also has education and health ministries through a clinic, pre-school, and library, all of which St. Luke's supports through financial contributions.

Who: St. Luke's members and guests, aged 13 & above, no upper limit

When: One week during the summer (2011: St. Luke's will send two groups - week of July 10 - 16 and July 17 - 24.) Travel on Sunday morning, return on Saturday afternoon.

What: Build a cinder block house for a Mexican family. Accommodations for the mission team are very comfortable (a Quality Inn with air conditioning and other amenities)

Where: Piedras Negras, Mexico which is the border town across from Eagle Pass, Texas. Missionaries fly into San Antonio, Texas and travel by van about 3 hours southwest.

Why: Serve God, meet new people, contribute to improving life for new Mexican friends.

Cost: Amount paid by individuals is approximately \$700. For youth, this is offset by Tartan Trot proceeds.

HONDURAS OUTREACH, INC.



Honduras Outreach is dedicated to building life-changing relationships between the people of the Olancho province of Honduras and caring North Americans. The area has one of the highest concentrations of infant mortality and poverty. Median rural family income is less than \$400. Sixty-eight of 1,000 children will die before reaching age five.

Groups of volunteers from the U.S. travel to Rancho el Paraiso, HOI's 1,600-acre working ranch in the Agalta Valley. From that base, the groups work side-by-side with Hondurans from nearby villages on community development projects, medical care, and friendship.

Those who join St. Luke's at work in Honduras and let the people of the valley into their lives say they will never be the same.

Who: St. Luke's members, typically focusing on youth and college students. Also, adults who love teenagers, particularly those with skills in nursing or medical field are encouraged to participate as space is available



What: Weeklong mission experiences every other summer

When: June 11-18, 2011

Cost: \$800, with funds provided by Tartan Trot, also donations through the year as needed

It is not overstated that people in the slums of Nairobi live in abject poverty, the economy of the country is in a bad state, and unemployment is often a way of life.

Maji Mazuri is a social economic development program created in 1984 by Wanjiku Kironyo and based in Nairobi, Kenya. Dr. Kironyo, began her work with a counseling center for women and children in Nairobi's slums. The program has grown and is currently composed of six interrelated projects ranging from several schools, an orphanage for severely mentally and physically challenged children, programs for young adults, and a micro-business program.

The mission of Maji Mazuri is to help people to escape from the bondage of poverty, ignorance and myth and become fully developed individuals. The vision is to provide the foundation, education and support needed for the children, youth and families in Nairobi's slums to become self-sustaining in terms of social, economic and spiritual well-being.

What: Ongoing support and partnership in this international mission and periodic mission trips to serve in Nairobi, also donations through the year as needed

MOUNTAIN T.O.P. / THE TENNESSEE OUTREACH PROJECT

Mountain TOP is an Interdenominational Christian Mission dedicated to rural life ministry in the Cumberland Mountains of Tennessee. St Luke's has had an annual presence at Mountain TOP since 2001. The opportunities to serve have expanded and increased over the years.

What: AIM (Adults in Ministry) brings together adult members from churches from all over the country to perform major home repairs or new additions for members of the community. Week long sessions in the summer of 2011 will be in June and July. Fall weekends run between September 29th and November 3rd.

Youth Summer Missions for St. Luke's is June 19-25, 2011 when 120-155 teenagers from all over come together to perform minor home repairs or conduct day camp activities to spread hope and expose local youth to the world and its opportunities.

Family Weekend April 15th to 17th offers the chance to serve others with any members of your family regardless of age.

Friends Weekend is from March 2nd to 6th. This is a time to come and go as your schedule allows and meet friends and renew friendships you have made with other servants whom you have met in the past. Work this weekend is on the facility and not in the community. There are also **special weeks** for college age campers and local youth in Summer Plus.

This annual regional offering supports residents in the Presbyterian Homes of Georgia.

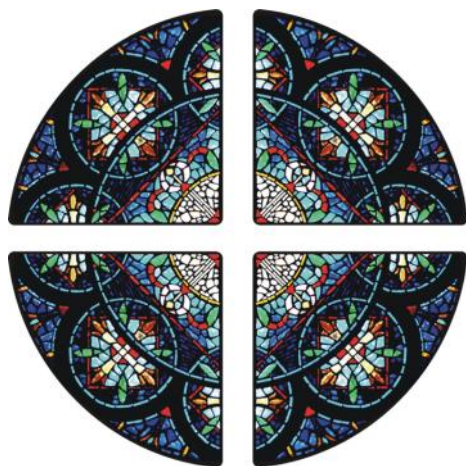
